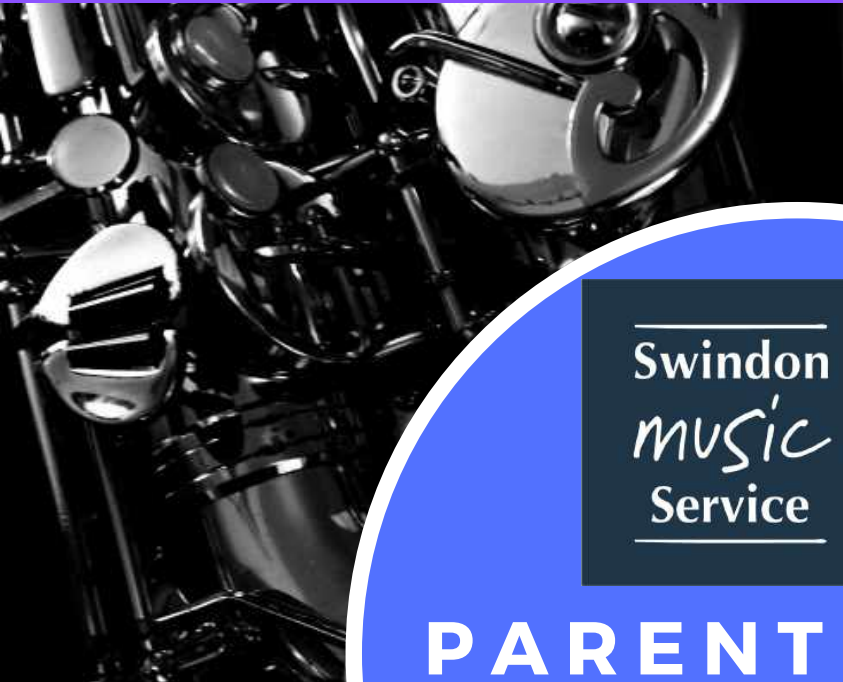

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The benefits of music

Music education, including learning to sing and to play a musical instrument, provides enormous benefits for young people in terms of their intellectual, social and emotional development, motor skills, language, and overall literacy. All children can enjoy and respond to music and everyone can become involved in music making to some degree.

What are the social benefits?

Music for pre-school children can help their transition into primary school

Introducing music to children at an early age can improve their ability to learn and promote sharing, creativity and concentration. These are all invaluable skills when they enter a primary school where they begin to form new friendships and develop social skills.

Learning to sing or to play a musical instrument impacts greatly on personal and social development

Learning to sing or to play a musical instrument can be extremely motivating and provides a feeling of accomplishment when goals are achieved. It improves coordination, motor skills and teaches discipline through regular practice. Music has been shown to increase children's confidence and self-esteem as a result of the encouragement and support from their teacher and by performing in front of peers or an audience. For children who have difficulty communicating verbally, music provides a way for them to express themselves in a non-verbal way. Music is a medium that is both accessible and inclusive.



What are the academic benefits?

Music can help to improve a child's reading ability

Learning to read music can improve students' ability to remember words and so improve their vocabulary and enhance their language development. Music involves constant reading and comprehension. When you see notes on a page, you have to recognise what the note name is and translate it to a pitch of note, finger or slide position. At the same time, you need to be able to decipher rhythmic patterns and if playing a brass or woodwind instrument use your tongue to produce the correct pattern.

Music can help to improve a child's numeracy skills

Reading music requires the counting of notes and decoding of rhythms which can enhance mathematical skills. The learning benefits derive from the similarity of rhythms and patterns and the ability to interpret notes and symbols. Even at an early stage, playing musical games or rhythm games can be a positive learning experience for children.

'Playing an instrument' can be used to achieve a Duke of Edinburgh Award (DofE)

'Playing an instrument' is one of the most popular activities used by students to achieve their Duke of Edinburgh Award. A DofE Award is an excellent way to demonstrate the skills developed through extra-curricular activities, particularly when applying to universities.

It can improve chances of accessing higher education

According to a poll of 63 university admissions teams, about 59% of staff say evidence of extra-curricular activities has become more pivotal in their decisions. (The Times Educational Supplement January 2015)

You can gain additional UCAS points for entry to higher education

Music exams taken through the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music (ABRSM), Trinity College of Music and Rockscool from grades 6-8 can attract 5-75 UCAS Tariff points. Trinity College London also award 35 UCAS Tariff points for Gold Arts Awards. Many higher education course providers use a UCAS Tariff points total in their entry requirements achieved by converting qualifications such as A levels (and many others) into points to allow them to compare applicants. Safeguarding online

Online tuition is safe and secure

One of the most important things for many parents when weighing up tuition is the safety aspect.

- **Will my child be safe with a tutor?**
- **Do I have to leave my child in a stranger's home?**
- **How will I know what goes on in the tuition sessions?**

All of the above are worries that may cross a parent's mind when they are researching a tutor, but online tutoring addresses each and every one of them. Thanks to the marvels of modern technology, each session will take place in the comfort of your own home, which means that not only will your child feel safe in a familiar environment, but you will also be able to keep an eye on what is going on.

Online tuition also gives Swindon Music Service the chance to firmly vet tutors to ensure that each and every one of them meets the high safety standards that are in place, and monitor lessons. This enables us to ensure that safeguarding procedures are followed, meaning you can rest easy when searching for a personal tutor from Swindon Music Service for online tuition.

How Swindon Music Service ensures your child is safe during their session.

The care of your child is top of the priority list here at Swindon Music Service, and we go to great efforts to ensure that they are safe during their music lessons. All of our tutors go through thorough enhanced DBS checks before they begin teaching, and we monitor and record lessons to make sure that your child, along with the hundreds of other children that are using our online service, is safe.

The role of the student

Learning to sing or to play a musical instrument can be an extremely rewarding experience that requires commitment and consistent practice. The student should be prepared to:

- Practice at least five days a week as recommended by their tutor.
- Attend lessons with the appropriate equipment and music.
- Participate in school and ensemble activities appropriate for their level where available.
- Maintain their instrument as instructed by their tutor if appropriate.



The role of the parent / guardian

The role of a parent / guardian of a child learning a musical instrument is extremely important in helping them reach their potential. This can be achieved by:

- Encouraging them to practise at least five days a week and monitoring their attendance at lessons, supporting any feedback from the tutor.
- Allowing them the appropriate space to practise away from distractions such as pets, televisions etc. The ability to concentrate and listen is very important.
- Providing the necessary resources such as music, strings, rosin, reeds, valve oil etc. where appropriate. It is important to provide a music stand or a similar arrangement which allows the child to sit / stand properly. Bad postural habits can affect the child's technique or, if learning a woodwind or brass instrument, their breathing technique.
- Ensuring that you have collected their instrument (if appropriate) before the lessons commence and being aware that it is the child's responsibility to maintain their instrument.
- Having an active involvement in their development and sharing their enthusiasm.



The role of the parent / guardian

Good Practice

Communications:

Communications must be undertaken by parents/carers and not pupils on the parental devices. Ensure that no private chats happen between your child and any tutor or that they share images. Do not allow your child to communicate with any tutor outside of the scheduled session.

Appropriate Language:

As with all communications, the content and language of messages must at all time be professional by all parties concerned. The duration of the lessons should be kept to a reasonable length in order to allow the family to 'get on' with their day.

Suitable Teaching Environment:

Both pupils and tutors must be physically located in safe working spaces, appropriate for online lessons; a lounge or study is appropriate, a bedroom or bathroom is not. Parents should ensure that their child is in a room with, or near, an adult and that the adult can hear and see the lesson taking place. It is the responsibility of the parent/carer to ensure that this happens.

Professional Standards:

Online classrooms must be regarded as an extension of the physical classroom and the safeguarding expectations that pertain to this, such as, professional communications, attire, and language.

Adult Supervision:

The tutor should confirm at the start of each lesson that an adult is in close proximity to the pupil with you. If you cannot ensure that an adult is available at the pupil's home, the lesson should not go ahead.

Professional Appearance:

Pupils and tutors should be dressed appropriately for remote teaching.

Safeguarding:

Parents/carers should ensure tutors wear a badged lanyard at all times during the lesson. Parents should check with Swindon Music Service that the tutor has an up-to-date DBS check. SMS tutors are checked every three-years

Additional tuition

Students receiving lessons through Swindon Music Service are advised not to receive additional tuition from another tutor/teacher on the same instrument. There are no benefits to having an additional tutor/teacher and it is important that you are aware of the issues that can arise if you choose to do this. Each tutor/teacher has an individual approach to teaching and therefore learning with two specialists can be very confusing for the child and may hinder progress.



Care of instruments

Musical instruments are fragile and expensive, it is the child's responsibility to maintain their instrument. We would recommend that you:

- Ensure that the instrument is treated with care at all times as directed by the tutor and, if on loan, is returned in good condition when requested.
- Allow the instrument to only be used by the student to whom it belongs.
- Ensure that space is made available for the safe keeping of the instrument, when it is not being played it should be kept in the case.

Hire

Instrument hire is available through the Swindon Music Service Hire Service, parents are required to collect and return the instrument from/to the SMS office at The Platform, Faringdon Road, Swindon SN1 5BJ. Buying an instrument

If you are considering buying your child a musical instrument, we strongly advise that you speak to your child's tutor who will advise you which instrument is best for your child. Our tutors are specialists in their field and have a vast knowledge on the appropriate make and price of instruments suitable for the level of your child.

The Swindon Music Service Instrument Hire Service sometimes offers second hand instruments for sale at low prices. An Assisted Purchase Scheme is also sometimes available. Through this scheme the service purchases the instrument of your choice, you then repay the service interest free over an agreed period of time. The instrument remains the property of Swindon Music Service until all payments have been made. Should you move to live elsewhere away from Swindon all outstanding costs must be completed. This scheme is available to all students in receipt of a lesson through Swindon Music Service and in full time education in Swindon.
